

Have you ever wondered what your cat's really thinking or what it means when your cat wags their tail?

Learning to read the body language of a cat is a great way to understand your feline friend's feelings and improve your relationship with them!

## What is my cat "saying" with their tail?

- Straight up tail friendly and confident, happy to see you!
- Question mark tail a vertical tail with a softly curled tip shows the cat is happy and wanting to interact.
- Tail tucked away down low feeling unsure or unsafe, something is upsetting this cat.
- Puffed up tail like a fluffy pipe cleaner, this shows a startled or frightened cat.
- Swishing tail from side to side if rapidly flicking this can show frustration or excitement, if slowly swishing can be a sign of focus on something they are focused on, and maybe want to pounce on.

## Why is my cat making that noise?

- Meow often heard as a greeting on your return home, a request (e.g., for food or attention) or if incessant could mean they aren't well or are telling you they are frustrated or upset.
- Purr generally the sound of a happy, relaxed cat but can also be heard in cats trying to self-soothe if they are unwell or after a stressful event.
- Hiss keep away!
- Growl another warning to keep away!
- Yowl can be heard in cats that are very distressed or in pain, during cat fights, or when calling (if a female cat is in season or 'on heat')

## What else is my cat trying to tell me?

- Kneading with front paws this shows an affectionate and relaxed cat as they 'make biscuits' by a dough kneading type action on your lap or other soft surface.
- Rolling over this shows a cat trusts you as they expose their vulnerable belly toward you as a social greeting, but beware as it's not an invitation to pat them and many cats don't like tummy rubs.
- Rubbing against you this is a cat's way of marking you with their scent and showing that they like you.
- Zoomies cats may rapidly rush around the house after a period of rest or boredom, also commonly seen after a cat has successfully used the litter tray!
- Ears pricked forwards shows interest, ears pinned back can indicate fear.
